Phenomenology is an approach to qualitative research that focuses on the commonality of a lived experience within a particular group. The fundamental goal of the approach is to arrive at a description of the nature of the particular phenomenon (Creswell, 2013). Typically, interviews are conducted with a group of individuals who have first-hand knowledge of an event, situation or experience.

Phenomenological Research: A phenomenological study design is one which describes meaning for several individuals of their lived experiences of a concept or a phenomenon. The Phenomenologists focus on describing what all participants have in common as they experience any phenomenon (e.g., grief is universally experienced).

Definition. Now called Descriptive Phenomenology, this study design is one of the most commonly used methodologies in qualitative research within the social and health sciences. Used to describe how human beings experience a certain phenomenon.

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Edmund Husserl (1859-1938), a philosopher, established the discipline of phenomenology. In Husserl's approach to phenomenology, now labelled descriptive phenomenology, experiences are described and researcher perceptions are set aside or 'bracketed' in order to enter into the life world of the research participant without any presuppositions. 1 Experience is recognised to involve perception, thought, memory, imagination and emotion, each involving 'intentionality', as the ...

Phenomenology - Research Methodology

Qualitative research may be located in any one of three paradigms, positivist, interpretivist, and critical (Denzin & Lincoln, 2003; Punch, 1998). A paradigm is a structure or a set of suppositions and ideas that provides a pathway to see what the world looks like when its scientific aspect is related to its assumptions.

Qualitative Research Method - Phenomenology

Phenomenological Design Contradictory to other qualitative research designs, phenomenology focused on the essence of the participants' experiences to derive at an explanation that provided support in understanding the phenomenon of doctoral student attrition (Creswell, 2007).
